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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course invites students to think about the social, cultural, and religious specificity of Black Denver. Students are introduced to key contemporary figures and historic places through visits and interviews. Students have an opportunity to learn critical analysis and qualitative research skills.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. To begin learning the Black cultural spaces of Denver, and especially Black religious cultures of Denver.
- 2. To hone observational and research skills. To develop qualitative research skills in general.
- 3. To identify, articulate, and analyze the strengths and weaknesses, challenges and success of Black religious spaces in Denver from both internal perspectives and the perspectives of outside of observers.
- 4. For students who are not local to Denver, to learn about other regions in comparative analysis with Black religious Denver.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- COMPLETION OF READING ASSIGNMENTS PRIOR TO THE FIRST CLASS MEETING OF THE WEEK FOR WHICH THE READINGS ARE ASSIGNED INCLUDING READING THE WEEK'S DISCUSSANT'S RESPONSE PAPER.
- ACTIVE PARTICIPATION AND "ATTENDANCE" (I.E. WEEKLY LECTURE VIEWING AND RESPONSE) FOR THE CLASS SESSIONS.
- **SITE VISITS.** Observation Log on five (5) visits.
- FINAL PRESENTATION ON ONE SITE.
- **RESPONSE PAPERS.** You are responsible for writing response papers every week with the exception of the first week of class and the last week of class (2 page, doubled-spaced, 12-point font). These response papers should be posted on *Canvas* a full 24-hours *prior* to the start of the class session to which they apply.
